IMD ISSUES RED ALERT IN ASSAM AMID HEAVY RAINS AND FLOODS

India Meteorological Department (IMD) predicted that heavy rainfall would continue in Assam and other NorthEastern states till June 17

Heavy rainfall ranging from 150-200 mm daily across Northeast India had been predicted during this period. It might even raise to 500 mm, posing a flooding threat and landslide over the region.

ADVISORIES ISSUED BY DISTRICT ADMINISTRATION

In lieu of river Barak having crossed the danger level on 18th June 2022 & in anticipation of heavy rainfall for the next 3 (three) days in Cachar District as per reports received from Regional Meteorological Cente, public were requested to avoid moving out of their residences other than for emergency requirements or medical purposes.

Further, People residing in and around vulnerable locations (i.e. close to river banks, landslide-prone areas) were requested to shift to the nearest relief camps or to the nearest School/Community Buildings for immediate shelter. All relief operation measures are underway.

This Advisory was issued in the interest of public safety and contact details of District Emergency Operation Centre (DEOC), Cachar was shared through social/print media etc.









- District & Circle Level Flood preparedness meeting has been completed with all the line departments and provided necessary directions to concerned stakeholders.
- Circle Level sector Plan in connection with Disaster response has been prepared in 5 Revenue Circles.
- Circle Level Task Force is formed for post-flood damage assessment.
- Constituted Sub- Divisional Relief Committee for Lakhipur & Katigorah Sub-Division.
- DTO Cachar has been designated for providing Transportation facilities during floods or any other disaster. (Designated area Manager as per IRS)
- Coordination with designated NDRF, Assam Rifles & SDRF team has been completed for the flood rescue operation.
- A total of 104 nos. of relief camps have been identified in the District.



Project **SURAKSHA**

AN INITIATIVE TO MAP THE NEED AND RESOURCES FOR FLOOD VICTIMS



BACKGROUND

In view of the ongoing flood problem Project 'Suraksha' is initiated by District Administration in coordination with Impact Weaver to help out the distressed and connect with the people in need.

METHODOLOGY/STRATEGY

A pool of volunteers has been recruited to handle calls, maintain records of those calls, and additional support. The requirements are collated from the social media platforms, no network zones and others. A database is maintained.

These data are organised, analysed, separated area-wise and sent to the concerned departments. The compiled reports are generated periodically to update the administration and estimate the relief materials demand. These have been sent to DDMA Cachar Control room, DDMA team, ASDMA control room

The rescue team and NDRF are communicated for urgent evacuations related to pregnant women, people who needed medical assistance and tiny babies. The relief teams and the Nodal officers shared with the area-wise requests received for distribution of drinking water, evacuation, candles and lighters and essentials as needed and requested. The urban and rural requests received are segregated and cascaded accordingly.

NGOs (Leo, Care Foundation, Dhaga, Thousand Sayantans, Netaji Chatra Yuva Sangstha) and individuals have communicated area-wise for massive outreach for the distribution of medicines, baby food, aid to patients, and relief to the needy.

PROJECT TIMELINE: 21 June 2022 - 30 June 2022

The volunteers in PROJECT SURAKSHA have worked in addressing distress calls, registering entries, social media grievance collation, collecting information from no network zone areas and others. With the passage of time, there has been a decline in call rates. The calls and enquiries which are being received are being cascaded and mitigated accordingly.



AIR DROPPING OF RELIEF KITS

Due to the mammoth magnitude of impact in Cachar district, it was difficult to serve all victims through boats or other means. Hence airdropping was undertaken to provide relief kits to the flood victims. In the first phase, air dropping of essentials was targeted in the Silchar town and its peripheral area while in the 2nd phase remote areas were covered.

DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC HEALTH AND ENGINEERING

The supply of clean and safe drinking water to the affected people in the midst of the flood crisis was effectively met by the Department of Public Health Engineering with the active support of DDMA, Cachar despite the damages in river water ducts due to strong water currents. Large stock of packaged drinking water, chemical packets, halogen tablets and bulk water supplies were carried out together with construction of makeshift tiolets.

Reportedly, a total of 17,075 people took shelter in 53 relief camps in the district, of which 1,572 are in 20 relief camps in Katigorah, 15,443 in 32 relief




Landmark Achievement
